Sabbatical Leave

After much conversation and planning, the time has finally arrived for the first portion of my sabbatical. I will be touring with a group from Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in California from July 5 through July 24. We will visit the historical and inspirational sites of Martin Luther in Germany.

Deitrich Bonhoeffer, Lutheran Pastor, and author, was executed in the concentration camps in Germany. He wrote words of hope for all around him to see and hear and for us, 80 years later, to reflect upon. His conviction to stand firmly with the Jews and not hand life over to the Nazis leaves a lasting impression of God's love and life upon our hearts. I look forward to learning more about him and his strong conviction as a Christian to defend those being oppressed.



The final leg of our trip will be to Oberammergau to experience the Passion Play. This play of the life of Jesus Christ gives up hope when dire circumstances surround us. It is through the teachings, the crucifixion, and the resurrection of Christ our Lord that our hope and life have meaningful existence. Seeing this play will be a wonderful and significant reminder of the basics of my faith and life with God.

I look forward to sharing my journey with you upon my return. While I am away, the following pastors are available for pastoral care as needed.

It is my hope that the sabbatical will be renewing to my soul, my family relationships, my faith, my energy level, and my ability to continue serving as a healthy pastor in this place.



2022 Assembly Happenings

- Joined in devotions led by Deacon Margaret Folkemer-Leonard, assembly chaplain.
- Praised God through a Service of the Word with the Necrology.
- Remembered the following rostered ministers who died since the last assembly in 2021: The Rev. David W. Clark; the Rev. Marshall H. Gante; the Rev. Richard E. Geib; the Rev. E. Edward Keyser; the Rev. William C. Knotts; the Rev. L. Guy Mehl; the Rev. Raymond A. Sisteck; the Rev. Martin L. Swartz; Deacon James H. Wise.
- Welcomed the Rev. Dr. Roger Willer as our churchwide representative.
- Honored the Rev. Beth Martini, assistant to the bishop, for ten years of ordained ministry.
- Launched the annual Generosity Appeal, designated this year for youth ministry.
- Considered memorials regarding restructuring the ELCA, divesting of Russian assets, and upholding the Office of Ministry for all rostered ministers.
- Elected members of the Synod Council and a board member for Susquehanna University.
- Blessed and sent the Voting Members of the 2022 Churchwide Assembly.
- Amended synod bylaws.
- Enjoyed mission videos from a variety of agencies and ministries.
- Installed the newly-elected members of the Synod Council and newly-elected conference secretaries.
- Blessed and sent Bishop Dunlop on sabbatical later this summer.
- Rejoiced to have finished the work of the synod assembly ahead of schedule.

2022 Assembly Actions

- ❖ Adopted the agenda and Rules of Procedure.
- ❖ Adopted the proposed budget for FY 2023 of \$2,320,000.
- ❖ Adopted the beginning minimum base salary and housing allowance for 2023 of \$57,760 for ministers of Word and Sacrament who serve full time at the time of their ordination and the beginning minimum salary for 2023 when housing is provided of \$40,185 for ministers of Word and Sacrament who serve full time at the time of their ordination.
- ❖ Adopted the beginning minimum salary for 2023 of \$53,865 for ministers of Word and Service who serve full time at the time of their ordination.
- ❖ Elected Synod Council members: Debra Barrett, the Rev. Angela Hammer, Hallie McCoy, Andrea Oslikova, the Rev. Ben Siebert, and Evan Williams.
- ❖ Amended bylaw S11.05.01. to make the language agree with the *Audit Committee Charter*, a policy of this synod, and assure the independence of the committee.
- ❖ Added bylaw S7.26.01. to establish the process by which baptized and confirmed members of synod-authorized worshiping communities may be certified as voting members of synod assemblies.
- ❖ Added bylaw S7.27.01. to establish the process by which a minister of Word and Sacrament from a church body with which a relationship of full communion has been declared and established by the Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America may by the Synod Council be granted the privilege of both voice and vote in the Synod Assembly during the period of that minister's service in a congregation of this church.
- ❖ Amended bylaws S12.04.01., S12.04.02., and S12.04.03. to permit both ministers of Word and Service (deacons) and ministers of Word and Sacrament (pastors) to serve as conference dean and secretary.

THE GREATEST GIFT

When my children were young, I spent way too much money on far too many playthings. With my grandchildren, I had a chance to pull back on the gifting (with the help of my practical daughter-in-law). As a result, my two young grandsons take good care of what they receive for birthdays and Christmas and never ask for more. I confess that I still overdo it on occasion, but progress is being made.

One present I will never stint on: the gift of my faith. It's a joy to say grace and read from a story Bible. I love to involve the children in our church education program and vacation Bible school. It's a thrill to watch Aiden and Peter making crafts and playing games that reinforce Scripture, to hear their sweet voices raised in song. (The current favorite, even in summer, is the Christmas number "Baby Jesus, We Love You.")

As I get older, I have many more opportunities to cherish such moments than I did as a harried young mom of five children. "Nana" has extra time for a long chat about heaven, as I did recently with 5-year-old Peter. Turns out, we both have questions about details, but Peter also has firm faith in the afterlife.

Peter believes in the power of prayer too. In December, I overheard him in his bedroom praying that his big brother would get a "box of treasures" for Christmas. He wasn't surprised when some treasures for Aiden appeared under the tree—of course his prayer had been answered!

At my age, the rapid passage of time is bittersweet. So it's all the more precious that I can be with my

little guys often now, and that we are living our lives together as beloved children of God.

Practices

- **Incorporate simple service projects into fun times with your grands.** Bake treats for homebound neighbors; draw valentines for first responders. Even the youngest can and should know that they're capable of helping others. Remind them that God is delighted when they make someone else happy.
- **Enjoy spiritual books together.** Beyond story Bibles lies a world of wonderful children's books with a spiritual focus. We enjoy Archbishop Desmond Tutu and Douglas Carlton Abrams' *God's Dream* (Candlewick, 2010) and *What Is God Like?* by Matthew Paul Turner and Rachel Held Evans (Convergent, 2021). There's nothing lovelier than cuddling in a rocking chair and turning pages.
- **Take time over a meal or before bed to have conversations about God.** Don't be surprised if they offer sophisticated observations! And don't feel you have to be a "wise elder" or experienced theologian. The kids aren't expecting precise answers. They want a safe place to explore questions with someone who loves them. †

Dear Friends at First,

It has been over a month since I returned from my trip to Slovakia to help the Ukrainian refugees and it has been over two full months since the beginning of the war. The trip was powerful, moving and in many ways heartbreaking, and I still can't believe there is war in Europe, right on the doorsteps of my home country. The suffering of mothers and grandmothers taking their children into safety, making sure they experience as little trauma as possible. As one mother said, *"during the day we try to make the journey an adventure for the children, and then at night we cry."* And who wouldn't cry, when you have to leave our homeland, your family and friends, but also your career, your interests and your dreams. I know many of us can't even imagine what that must be like.

It is in the midst of this kind of suffering, that I've also experienced the incredible response of so many who live out Christ's calling to love their neighbor and help those in need: volunteering at the border, handing out supplies, carrying suitcases, cooking meals, providing health care or a warm place to stay overnight. People that drive those in a need of accommodations and then churches, organizations and families that are housing those without a home. The need is tremendous, not only at the border, but also in the places where people are committed to helping the refugees long term—opening their homes to strangers, without knowing how long they will stay. I had the privilege to work with these churches and organizations and with your financial support we continue to lend a helping hand during this humanitarian crisis.

As I have said, the work is not over. There are more people coming, with an immediate need of help, but there are also those, who now deal with integration into their new "home" and recovery from the trauma they experienced along the way. Our commitment is to stay involved in aiding those in need. So far we were able to distribute \$37,000 to congregations that are working directly with refugees. The financial support is helping with accommodations, food, clothing, transportation and school supplies for kids as well as direct help at the border. We are also helping inside Ukraine, at the border city of Uzhhorod, where thousands of Ukrainians fled from the areas affected by war. In Uzhhorod we are partnering with Salvation Church, as they are feeding, housing, transporting and helping those looking for safety in their city but not looking to leave their country.
